# KEYNOTES

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**FYI:** The *Keynotes* has three objectives – to give the membership an overview of the Board activities, to provide information about activities, and to highlight issues important to the members. Comments are welcome.

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## Treasurer's Report – Bill Cummings

At the February business meeting I kicked off the preparation of the 2008-2009 Driftwood Key by requesting each board member and each committee chairman to provide me with their budget needs for the coming fiscal year by the March Workshop. I requested that this be completed by the end of March. It is anticipated that discussion of these requirements will be a major element of the April Workshop. The budgeting process is described in Driftwood Key draft policy FN04, "Budgeting Policies".

Initial inputs should be emailed to me. I will make myself available (insofar as a non-resident can) for one-on-one discussions as needed for clarification and fine tuning throughout the month of March.

FN04 requires that a preliminary budget be available for discussion at the May workshop and the Board of Trustees is required to adopt the Club budget at their regular June business meeting. The board-adopted budget will be presented to the membership at the July annual meeting for ratification.

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## Policies & Procedures – Don Jones

A big project recently completed by the Committee has been publishing the Board Handbook, 2008 Edition. It includes ninety pages of DKC policies and procedures, duties and responsibilities, rules and regulations, and other useful information. About half of the documents in this Handbook have been formally approved by the Board. Copies of individual documents are available from the Office. In addition, customized handbooks for Board Officers are in process. The Committee is working on the following topics: Enforcement Procedures; Nominating Committee; Club

Funds and Accounts; Archives and Record Keeping; and guidelines for Board meetings. If you have concerns you would like addressed on any of these topics, please contact me (360-638-1981).

Recent Board approval has been given to the following policies and procedure documents: Delinquent Dues and Assessments, Pool Rules, Clubhouse Rental Rules and a Long Range Planning Charter. The later is included in this month's Keynotes. Many thanks to the many individuals (too many to name) who helped whip these documents into shape.

## OC15 - Long Range Planning Committee

**OC15.1 – Purpose:** The purpose of the Long Range Planning Committee is to plan for the future of the Driftwood Key Club and the Driftwood Key community in a way that protects and enhances the assets of the Club, promotes a sense of community and takes into consideration the trends in demographics. For at least the initial stages of planning, the Committee shall strive for the widest possible scope and vision while focusing on both longer and shorter-range goals.

**OC15.2 - Scope and Charter:** The Committee shall examine the widest range of topics potentially impacting the Driftwood Key Club and the Driftwood Key community and shall make written recommendations to the Board regarding its findings. Topics that could be addressed by the Committee include: Club owned and managed facilities, non-Club owned community facilities, Club finance, Club governance and management, safety and security in the community, member land use, enhancing the natural environment, relationships with surrounding communities. Regarding existing Club-owned facilities, the Committee shall establish the life expectancy of these facilities and recommend improvements that might extend their useful life. The Committee shall also identify capital and infrastructure improvements that are either necessary or from which the membership might benefit or otherwise enjoy. Implementation plans for these facility improvements shall include funding reserve recommendations, cash flow analyses and target schedules.

The Committee shall establish the extent to which the membership would support recommended changes and improvements. Materials sent to the general membership shall be submitted to the Board for prior approval.

The Committee shall work with the Treasurer on budget development as it relates to accomplishing both future Committee tasks and Board approved long-range projects.

The Board shall select the Committee chairperson and Board liaison. The chair and liaison shall recommend additional members for the Committee to be approved by the Board.

## Governance Committee – Bruce O'Connor

The Board at its February meeting approved the Member Handbook prepared by the Committee. The handbook includes a preface, a table of contents, the Protective Covenants, the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws, the ACC Rules, an index to these documents, a preface to the Board's Policies that pertain to members, the member-specific Policies, and a Schedule of assessments, dues, and fees of the Club.

The Board decided that distribution of the current "redbook" of governance documents is to be immediately terminated. Distribution of the Member Handbook will be in various forms. One form will be posting of an electronic copy of the handbook on the Club's Web site currently under construction.

Hard copies also are available at the Club office. Other forms of distribution being considered are by e-mail, by CD ROM, and by mail. The electronic copies of the handbook are advantageous, in that the table of contents includes hyperlinks that permit the user to rapidly move to the topic of interest.

All members are encouraged to obtain a copy of and review in detail the Member Handbook. This document provides the baseline for consideration of revisions to the governance documents that will be proposed to the Board by the Committee.

Regarding such revisions, the Committee has completed its initial review of amendments to the Articles of Incorporation proposed by the Club's special counsel in response to the Committee's and Board's instructions late last year. The Committee is proceeding with its initial review of a clean set of bylaws, modeled after the existing bylaws, and also proposed by special counsel. Once the Committee and special counsel have come to an understanding regarding the revisions, the Committee will make a corresponding report to the Board for its review and approval. This report will include a summary of the revisions, and a comparison of the revised documents with the existing documents. Once the Board approves the Committee's report, the focus groups that the Committee is forming will be given their chance to comment on the revisions.

The Committee's work continues on a review of the ACC Rules, as does its indexing of Club archives and its work on archiving policies (in conjunction with the Policy and Procedures Committee).

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**GREATER HANSVILLE AREA ADVISORY COUNCIL – Jerry Ulsund**  
Recap of January and February, 2008

Regarding Stormwater Management, Dave Tucker, Senior Program Manager of Kitsap County Surface and Stormwater Management Program attended and took information from council members regarding the impact of the December storm. He took notes and answered questions regarding the County's response to flooding in the Greater Hansville Area due to the very heavy rain. Bob Cipra, Driftwood Key Stormwater Committee leader attended and opened a line of communication with Dave Tucker regarding Driftwood Key's storm water runoff problems specifically.

The Road Safety Advisory Committee reported that there was a large turnout at their last meeting with 12 visitors making 10 negative comments and two positive comments. The committee drafted a letter listing the complaints including

the correction of installation issues that caused some of the speed tables to be inconsistent with applicable standards. After listening to public comments at the GHAAC meeting, including suggestions that a cross over road be pursued, increasing the speed limits, and increasing speed enforcement, the committee asked the GHAAC to pass a motion to endorse their letter to the County. It was passed with a cover letter attached that acknowledged the County's cooperation and support in getting the speed tables installed but stressed the community concerns about the speed tables conforming with applicable standards. The agenda for future meetings of the RSAC will follow up with the preliminary results of the recent speed check tests on Hansville Road, Twin Spits Road, and Hood Canal Drive as well as information on the results of a meeting held on February 28, 2007 that began the formation of two committees that will explore alternatives to the speed tables.

The Saltwater Parks Committee which indicated that the master planning process for Norwegian Point Park will begin in January, the Energy Committee reported that the new PSE substation should be running soon, the GHA Sign Committee reported that the new sign should be completed and in place by early Spring, the new GHA Planning Committee will launch their work in January, 2008, and the Olympic Properties Group and Hansville Greenway have agreed on terms for a significant extension of the Hansville Greenway involving 112 acres between Shorewoods (the old gravel pit on Hood Canal Drive) and the center of Hawks Hole Creek with two and a half miles of new trail easement.

Council comments included a report by Jerry Ulsund, who was joined by Bob Cipra, Driftwood Key Stormwater Committee leader, regarding the use of biosolids as fertilizer

at the Hood Canal Nursery, located on the plateau above Driftwood Key. The biosolids are a product of Karcher Creek Sewer District

Wastewater Treatment Facility and it was determined that the program will comply with all acceptable State, Federal, and County regulations therefore not requiring an environmental impact statement. This information was recently brought to Driftwood Key's attention by the GHAAC and acted upon immediately. If you want more information contact Lawrence J. The Greater Hansville Area Planning Committee reported that over 45 people attended the first meeting of this new committee that is beginning to look into and establish a "Community Plan" regarding both the area outside of the downtown area that encompasses Driftwood Key and the downtown area itself. The committee is supported by Pete Sullivan, Kitsap County Planning Department who will help facilitate a formal planning process which mirrors plans that are used in smaller communities not attached or abutting a city or unincorporated town. This group is a committee of the GHAAC but is not limited to council members. In fact, it is encouraged that this committee be made up of citizen volunteers who have a strong interest in the future of the GHA and would like a say it what that future may be. The Kitsap County Solid Waste Advisory Committee reported that this committee is currently discussing the burning of land clearing waste and what the future of burning may be. While there continues to be a great amount of burning in the GHA the amount of burning in the county has dropped dramatically leading the KCSWAC to consider a full time halt to land clearing burning. While this may be a year away the GHAAC may be asked to take a stand on this issue. Driftwood Key residents who rely on burning for lot clearing purposes should also be interested in this issue.

North Kitsap String of Pearls was a presentation by Jon Rose, Olympic Property Group, on a concept that they are working out with the county, to use their 2000 acres in the GHA in both a profitable and value to the community way. The seven elements to concept are:

1. Trails that unite all the small communities in North Kitsap.
2. Wildlife and Open space viability for the long term future
3. Marine and other recreational opportunities that promote tourism
4. Plants, farming and fishing enhancement
5. Education and life long learning opportunities in urban settings
6. Waterfront villages as destinations
7. Planning, coordination and cooperation for common goals

The letter below concerning Driftwood Key, GHAAC, and Kitsap County was sent to our County Commissioners with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

Dear Commissioners Jan Angel, Josh Brown, Steve Bauer:

The Greater Hansville Area Advisory Council (GHAAC) was formed in 2007 “to communicate with and represent the interests of the greater Hansville Area with Kitsap County and other government entities . . . to prioritize, organize, and facilitate enactment of GHA mandated goals. . . ” Article 1, Section 2 of GHAAC’s Bylaws state that the “The Kitsap County Board of Commissioners formally recognizes and confirms the Greater Hansville Area Advisory Council as the umbrella organization representing the Greater Hansville Area for purposes stated in these By-Laws.”

In essence, the Council has assumed, with the blessing of Kitsap County, the role of a shadow government for what the Council defines is Greater Hansville. That assumption disenfranchises the Driftwood Key Club, which is the elected government of the platted development known as Driftwood Key.

Driftwood Key is the largest residential community in the Hansville 98340 zip code. The Driftwood Key Club, through its elected board of 9 trustees, manages the affairs of the Driftwood Key community. The community is comprised of 775 residential lots, 505 of these lots have homes on them. The latest data from [www.brainyzip.com](http://www.brainyzip.com) shows that there are currently 1124 residences in zip code 98340. Using data from this source, the number of residences in Driftwood Key account for 45% of all residences located in the Hansville 98340 zip code.

Driftwood Key Club is not a member of the Greater Hansville Area Advisory Council (GHAAC) and its elected Board has not transferred authority to GHAAC to speak on behalf of the Driftwood Key community. Driftwood Key Club and its elected Board strongly oppose Kitsap County government formally recognizing and confirming GHAAC as *the* representative organization with the power to “negotiate with Kitsap County and other government entities and individuals, and other organizations and individuals on behalf of the greater Hansville community.”

Recognizing that Driftwood Key residences make up 45% of all residences in the Hansville 98340 zip code, Driftwood Key Club requests that Kitsap County accord the Club the same services and consideration it accords the GHAAC. The Board welcomes the opportunity to meet with the County Commissioners for the purpose of establishing a formal relationship with Kitsap County to represent the interests of our members.

A passenger was critically injured, and three other passengers were slightly injured, including his daughter ELIZABETH.

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## Emergency Preparedness --- Ilmar Lusia --- "... not 'IF' but 'WHEN'"

The monthly emergency preparedness meeting on February 21 at the Clubhouse did not draw a crowd. I have to assume that everybody is prepared to take a "no notice" outdoor camping trip for 10 days, since after an earthquake your house may not be habitable, even for shelter. I have to assume that your family emergency response plan is worked out and ready for all contingencies. In the event of a region-wide emergency, earthquake or fire, Kitsap County or NKFR help will not be available for some time. I have to assume that your food and drinking water supplies are adequate, in a protected place, and your "overnight kit" containing your medications, a spare pair of eyeglasses, hard soled shoes, leather gloves, a whistle and a flashlight is near your bed.

Our emergency preparedness network was developed two years ago. It is a "neighbor- helping - neighbor" system which springs into action after a community wide emergency. Like all dormant systems it has to be periodically tested and tried. We are not yet ready. Consider the possible conditions- no water supply, no power, no telephone or mobile communications, no "911 HELP", only one road out, and it may be blocked by trees and power

lines. Are you prepared? Will you help your neighbors? Your neighbor may have to save your life. Are they prepared? The system will not work without your participation.

### Activities and Opportunities Not To Be Missed:

Those of you interested in Red Cross First Aid and CPR training, please sign up at the DK office. The two courses cost \$55 and take about 7 hours. Classes are limited to 6 to 12 participants. Classes will be arranged when enough people sign up. A fire extinguisher demonstration and training is being negotiated with NKFR with the date and time to be announced later.

The next community meeting on emergency preparedness will take place on Thursday, March 27 at 7:00pm at the Clubhouse on the subject of communications in a disaster situation. Your cell phone will be overwhelmed. Buy yourself a referee's whistle to summon help if you are isolated, buried under rubble, or injured.

I will be contacting area coordinators individually. I do not want to preach "gloom and doom", but on the Pacific Rim earthquakes are a reality.

Many of you will be surprised to realize that DKC has not had a website. That will not be the case in the very near future. Stay tuned.

The Board of Trustees will be setting up a nominating committee, recruiting members to run for the Board. Anyone interested should contact a Board member.

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## Board of Trustees Meeting – January 10, 2008

Vice-President Bruce O'Connor opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance at 7:06pm. Board members present and introduced were Bill Cummings, Audrey Samuelson, Dennis Augustine, Jerry Matthewson, Mike Bookey, and Dennis Hardin. The Board approved the minutes of the December Meeting.

### Reports:

**Treasurer:** Bill Cummings' written report for December was submitted and discussed. Eleven members are more than a year delinquent in their dues; over forty members have not paid the Governance special assessment and are now sixty days late. Bill presented an amended "Schedule for Dealing with Unpaid (Delinquent) Dues and Assessments (Rev 5 of FN01.6).

**Architectural Control Committee:** Nothing reported.

**Dredging:** Bill Buegel met with the dredging contractor Friday, January 4. The contractor has begun dredging in the back bay and will excavate to final elevations from the back bay and marina out to the channel entrance. Individual dock dredging will not begin until the main channel is complete so that quantities of removed materials can be tracked. Jerry Matthewson reported that the loan documents for dredging are nearly complete and funding will be finalized by the end of January.

**Governance:** Bruce O'Connor' Governance Committee report (omitted from the December Keynotes) is as follows:

"A topic that continues to confuse many is the identification and categorization of those legal documents that establish the Driftwood Key community and enable the Board of Driftwood Key Club to govern that community. The term "Governance Documents" means those documents that must be approved by the members. These are

the Protective Covenants, the Articles of Incorporation of the Club, the Bylaws of the Club, and the Architectural Control Committee (ACC) Rules. The term "Policy" means any document that is adopted by the Board under its powers established by the Governance Documents.

The current "redbook" being distributed to members has been changed to delete all Policies (many of which pertained only to workings of the Board), and to substitute the integrated Protective Covenants documents prepared by the Committee and approved by the Board for the 7 sets of Protective Covenants previously distributed.

Under preparation is a Member Handbook of all member-specific Governance Documents and Policies that will include: a detailed table of contents; the integrated Protective Covenants document; the current Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, and Architectural Control Committee (ACC) Rules (all having been revised from those currently distributed to correct inaccuracies found by the Committee in its work); an index; and, the Policies that are specific to members. The significant feature of the Member Handbook is its format and organization, which permit members to find the Governance Document or Policy that pertains to any activity governed by the Club. Upon approval by the Board (most likely at the February meeting), the Member Handbook will replace the current redbook. The Committee emphasizes that no substantive change to any Governance Document or Policy has been made in the Member Handbook.

The Committee is also working on an index to all Club records stored in hard copy form in the Office, on an archive policy, and a

procedure for electronic archiving. A major project is a comparison of the ACC Rules with the Governance Documents, to provide a basis for a later recommendation to the Board as to revisions to the ACC rules.

The Committee is awaiting a revised set of Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws from by the Club's special legal counsel. These documents are being prepared on the basis of the detailed motion of the Committee passed at the November Board meeting. After the Board's consideration and further revision, the revised set will be the subject of focus group meetings with members representing every aspect of the diverse Driftwood Key community. Again, *the Committee invites all interested members to participate in this focus group, by calling or e-mailing Bruce O'Connor at 360-638-2499 or [b.oconnor@att.net](mailto:b.oconnor@att.net).*"

Bruce also reports that a filing system has been devised that will lead to an archival electronic filing system that will provide easy access to Club documents.

**Building and Grounds:** Jerry Matthewson said that the playground fence design needs to be completed before the end of the Fiscal Year. The North side DKC sign will be installed soon. Two coyotes were trapped and removed.

**Swimming Pool:** No report was made. The Club continues to contest the Draper and Dee litigations.

**Docks and Waterfront:** Two engineering firms submitted proposals to conduct a marina condition survey. Dennis Augustine's committee recommends Coast and Harbor Engineering to do this survey. The Puget Sound Anglers have offered to contribute two solar-powered Paton navigation lights for the channel entry. The Coast Guard will entertain a revision to the dredging permit to install these PATONS.

**Special Events & Fund Raising:** Audrey Samuelson reported that the New Year's Eve party was a great success. The next event will be a February 15 party celebrating the completion of the Dredging Project. This will be a thank you to all of those who contributed to the success of this project.

**Emergency Preparedness:** There is a meeting with the North Kitsap Fire District on January 24<sup>th</sup> to discuss what they can and cannot do for the Driftwood Key area.

**GHAAC:** Jerry Ulsund recapped the GHAAC meeting of January 8, at which Kingston ferries, speed bumps, Norwegian Point Park, new power lines, and planning, among other issues, were discussed. A Transportation Advisory Committee is being organized by the County; DKC member participation is urged. DKC residents who incurred storm damage can contact FEMA for assistance. Climate change strategy, S'klallam Tribe activities, and the Hansville Greenway were also on the agenda.

**Policy and Procedures:** This committee developed a charter statement for the Long Range Planning Committee. Board handbooks and enforcement policy are also committee focal points.

**Long Range Planning:** This committee will have a kickoff meeting January 31 at 7:00pm. Interested members should contact Dennis Augustine or come to the meeting.

**UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

**Long Range Planning:** A motion to accept the Purpose and Charter of the Long Range Planning Committee (OC15) was approved.

**Treasurer:** A motion to accept a revised Schedule for Dealing with Unpaid (Delinquent) Dues and Assessments, Rev 5 of FN01.6 was approved. Letters to those who have not paid their special assessment (\$45) for the Governance Committee special counsel are going out; keycards will be deactivated for those who do not pay within 15 days.

Most likely there will be an increase in member dues in the next fiscal year.

**NEW BUSINESS:**

**GHAAC:** A dialogue between the Club and Commissioner Bauer has begun. DKC has concerns that GHAAC may be considered by the County as the official voice of the Hansville area. Jerry Ulsund said that Commissioner Bauer does not consider GHAAC the exclusive pipeline through which Driftwood Key would channel its concerns. The issue is: Who has the right to represent Driftwood Key to the County? Comments were contributed by Jerry Ulsund, Bruce Cosacchi, John Hostvedt, and others. A motion to require the DKC representative to GHAAC to take direction only from the Board was disapproved – one argument being that the Driftwood Key rep to GHAAC includes more than the members of DKC. Proportional representation, participation in GHAAC and its relationship to the Board are all up for discussion. One member said that GHAAC has done much to benefit all of us and that we should not let one issue such as the speed bumps destroy DKC's relationship with GHAAC.

**PATONS:** A motion to accept the Puget Sound Anglers donation of red and green navigation lights on our waterway entrance pilings. DKC will maintain the lights.

**Docks and Waterfront:** A motion was approved to accept the committee's recommendation and authorize Coast and Harbor Engineering to conduct the marina condition survey in the amount of \$10,600 according to their proposal.

**Other:**

The sand dollar sign will be installed soon.

The feasibility of installing NO TRESPASS signs was discussed.

They are installed at the beach and docks. Around the parking lots and playgrounds, local law enforcement say they could enforce trespass laws if there were posted signs. The Building and Grounds committee will investigate. Discussion was tabled.

The general meeting was adjourned at 9:16pm.
